What is it?

- The Emergency Medicine Scholarship Rotation for Underrepresented Minority Students at Hackensack University Medical Center provides financial assistance for MS4 medical students applying to Emergency Medicine Residency Programs who meet the eligibility criteria below. The scholarship provides a \$2,000 stipend to help offset rotation living and travel expenses. This is a competitive merit-based scholarship reserved for 5 students per academic year.

Am I eligible?

- MS4 student in good standing at an accredited allopathic or osteopathic U.S. medical school not affiliated with HUMC
- Satisfactory completion of core MS3 clerkships
- Passing USMLE Step 1 or COMLEX Level 1

How do I apply?
